Community Priorities

Once again thank you for those Parishes who have returned their priorities for the last quarter. By returning these to us we can identify Community priorities and then aim to focus our attention on the main concerns. Speeding is one of the main concerns and the teams will get out and do enforcement when time allows. Shop Watch / Street Watch Schemes – Broadway

Shop Watch schemes are partnerships between your business, the police and others such as local authorities to support communities against retail-related crime We understand the devastating impact that crime can have on a business, which is why we want work together and help our local communities. They aim to:

- help prevent and detect crime in communities.
- find long-term solutions to local problems.
- provide a visible policing reassurance to local businesses.
- improve the communication flow between communities and the police.
- reduce and prevent criminality and antisocial behaviour.
- reduce the fear of crime by helping solve your crime-related problems.

Street Watch is a scheme that will give you the opportunity to help keep your local area safe, by walking around your neighbourhood and working with your local policing team to report any crime or anti-social behaviour that you may see.

Both schemes have been successfully implemented by PC Ben Trowman in Broadway with the majority of shops and establishments signed up and also two volunteers for Streetwatch. Find more information on watch schemes here:

Good News / Results

Town Centre officers have been on regular high visibility patrols in Evesham targeting shop theft, Anti-Social behaviour and Drugs. This has led to more than 15 arrests that the team have been involved with, including breaches of bail, drug possession, criminal damage and a number of prolific shoplifters, including one that the team successfully applied for a Criminal Behaviour Order on.

One of the teams' priorities is to reduce shop theft. This has meant that we have been targeting our repeat and prolific offenders and working with businesses and local agencies to achieve this in a partnership approach. Spending more time on the streets and with our communities. We have also set up the shop watch scheme within the town.

Further good news is that the PCC has announced additional officers for Evesham Town Centre. These additional officers will be arriving later in the year, and we will hopefully introduce them on the next newsletter.

Campaigns

We have seen **County Lines Intensification** week which focuses on tackling County Lines drugs Forcewide. This resulted in the Neighbourhood teams undertaking a number of actions including a significant amount of intelligence being submitted, numerous visits to houses in Evesham which had been previously targeted by county lines to provide them with reassurance, advice and Safeguarding. During this week we also visited the schools on our area to provide them with posters and inputs on knife crime to raise awareness. Plain clothed and hi visibility patrols were also conducted in the hotspots that dealers frequent to try and disrupt them. Arrests involving those involved in bring drugs into Evesham were also conducted by our Proactive team.

Please remember that if you have concerns around drugs and drug supply, you can contact the Police to report this or use Crimestoppers which is anonymous.





Anti-Spiking Week of action in March the team were out engaging with the local pubs and clubs regarding spiking. The pubs were issued with the Anti-spiking posters for them to display inside the venue. They were also provided with Anti-spiking devices for any bottled drinks they sell. All engaged well with the police and supported the initiative. E-Scooter Education & Campaign – The campaign, in partnership with Wychavon Council, follows community concerns in the district where people have been seen using the electric powered vehicles on the street.

PC Justine Lane, PC Martin Kennedy and other SNT officers have been visiting local schools where they were able to educate both pupils and teachers about the use of e-scooters. During the sessions students engaged with officers, asked questions, and took on board everything discussed.

The team have also been engaging with local business and members of the community and retailers around the illegal use of these scooters. This work will continue along with appropriate enforcement. You can legally buy e-scooters in the UK but you cannot ride them on a public road, cycle lane or pavement.

You can only ride e-scooters on private land with the landowner's permission.

This is because e-scooters are legally classed as motor vehicles and so must be taxed, insured, licensed and have a valid MOT. They must also have number plates, signal lights and visible rear lights. As most e-scooters do not have these features, they cannot be used legally on UK roads.







What happens if I am stopped by the police?

You will be advised on the law, may be asked to take your e-scooter home and may also risk the scooter being seized.

Depending on the seriousness of the offence you may also receive a Fixed Penalty Notice of:

•£300 and six penalty points for driving with no insurance •£100 and three to six penalty points for driving with no licence

Other offences you should be aware of that

will also result in penalties include:

- Riding on the pavement which may result in a £50 Fixed Penalty Notice
- Using a mobile phone while riding which may result in a £200 Fixed Penalty Notice and six penalty points
- Riding through red lights Fixed Penalty Notice of £100 and possible penalty points

Alcohol and e-scooters

If you are caught riding your e-scooter while over the legal drink drive limit then you will face the same penalty as someone caught drinking driving in a car. This includes a fine imposed by a court, a driving ban and possible imprisonment.

E-scooters and anti-social behaviour

If you're using an e-scooter in public in an anti-social manner, you can also risk the e-scooter being seized under Section 59 of the Police Reform Act.
